

Never ever play in a railway station or fool about on a train and certainly don't do dangerous things on or near a railway. You could be badly hurt or even killed.

Remember if you **PLAY SAFE**, you will **STAY SAFE!**

#### Behaviour at stations

A railway station is not a playground - never play with a ball or skateboard in a railway station, especially on the platforms. Stay away from the platform edge until the train has completely stopped.

#### Electricity Dangers

Many rail routes are electrified with overhead power lines carrying 25,000 volts or with a 'third rail' on the ground carrying 750 volts. These do not have to be actually touched for children to be badly maimed, burned or killed - electricity at high voltages can "jump" up to 3 metres (over 9 feet).

#### Behaviour on trains

A train is not a playground - never run in a train carriage, touch closed doors, open windows or try to get off a moving train. Death or serious injury has been caused when people have leaned out of a train window or fooled about on trains.

#### Graffiti

Spraying paint on trains or railway property is not only unsightly and costly to remove but such activity often involves trespass and leads to more serious criminal behaviour. Painting over railway warning signs can result in innocent lives being lost if the message cannot be read.

#### Trespass

Children as young as five years old have been caught trespassing on the railways playing games of 'chicken' in front of high-speed trains. If the driver puts on his brakes when a train is travelling at 125 mph, it takes up to 2000 metres (1¼ miles) for the train to stop.

#### Vandalism

Each year there are thousands of reported incidents of objects being placed on railway tracks, thrown at trains or dangled from bridges in front of trains. Most of these crimes are committed by young people - children as young as five years old have been caught putting objects on the tracks.

As you are colouring in the pictures please read the words as well.

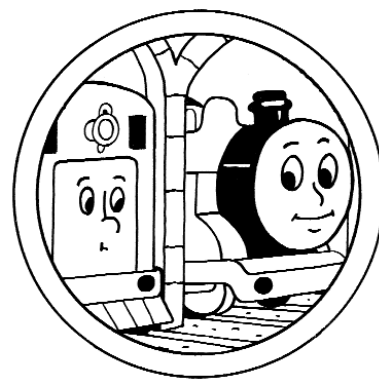

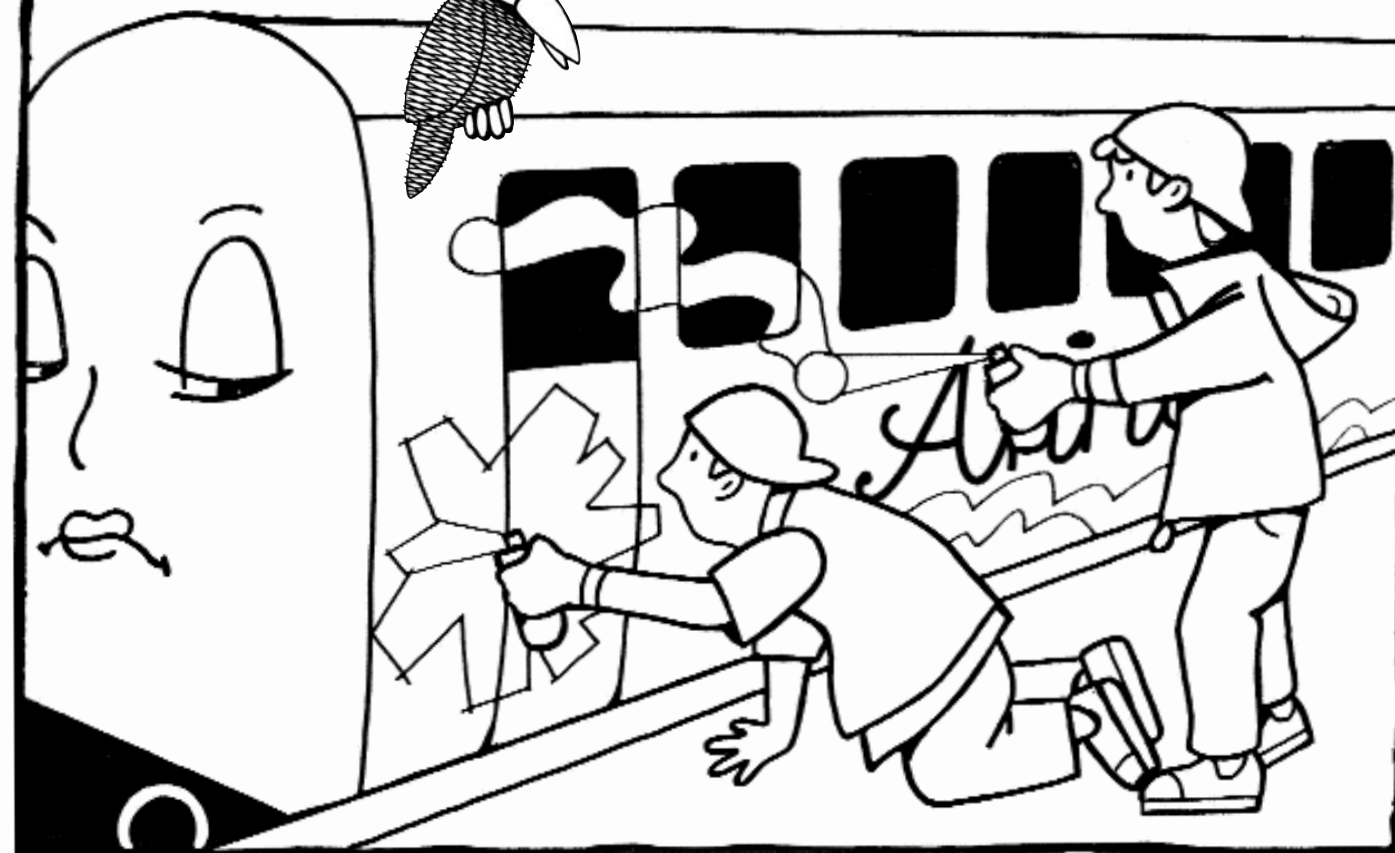


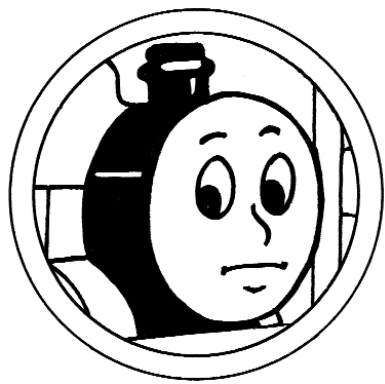
“Some children never learn”, sighed Thomas.

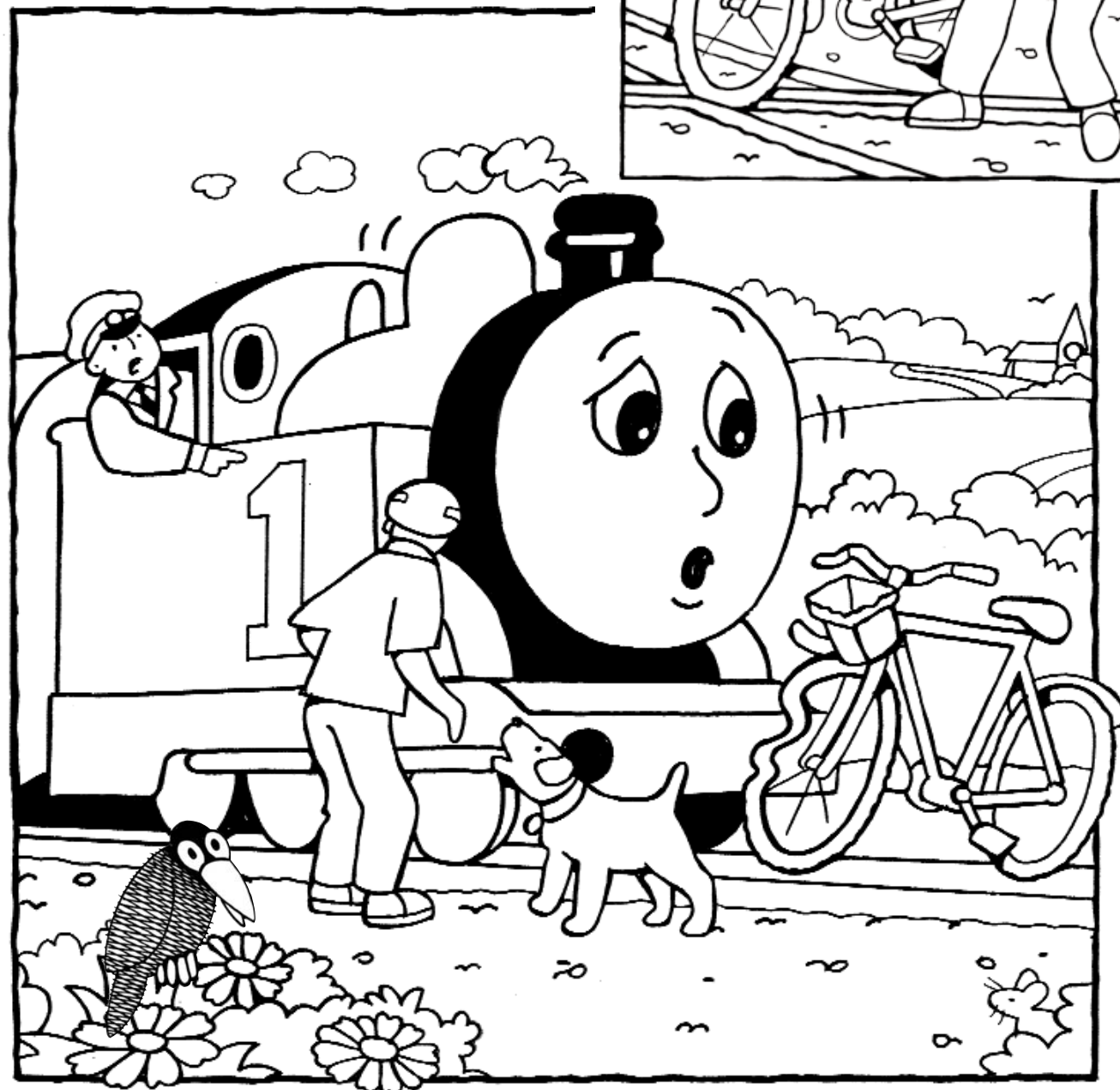
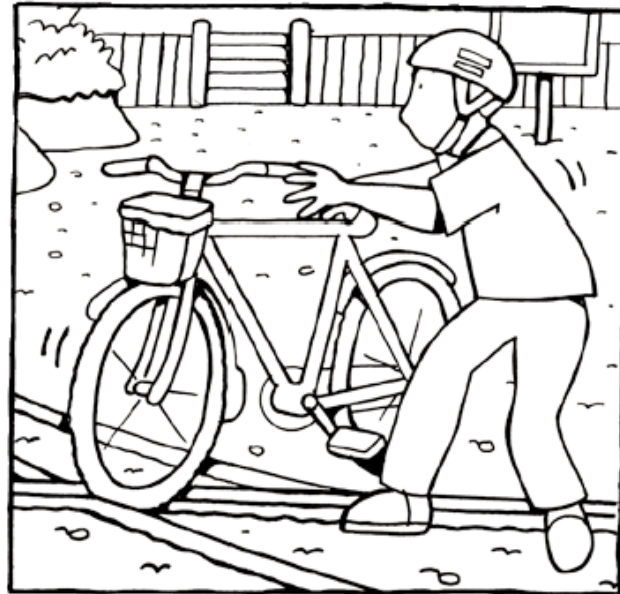




“There was another silly boy called Andrew. He was with Lucy his dog and decided to take his bike on the railway track, but it got stuck.” said Thomas.

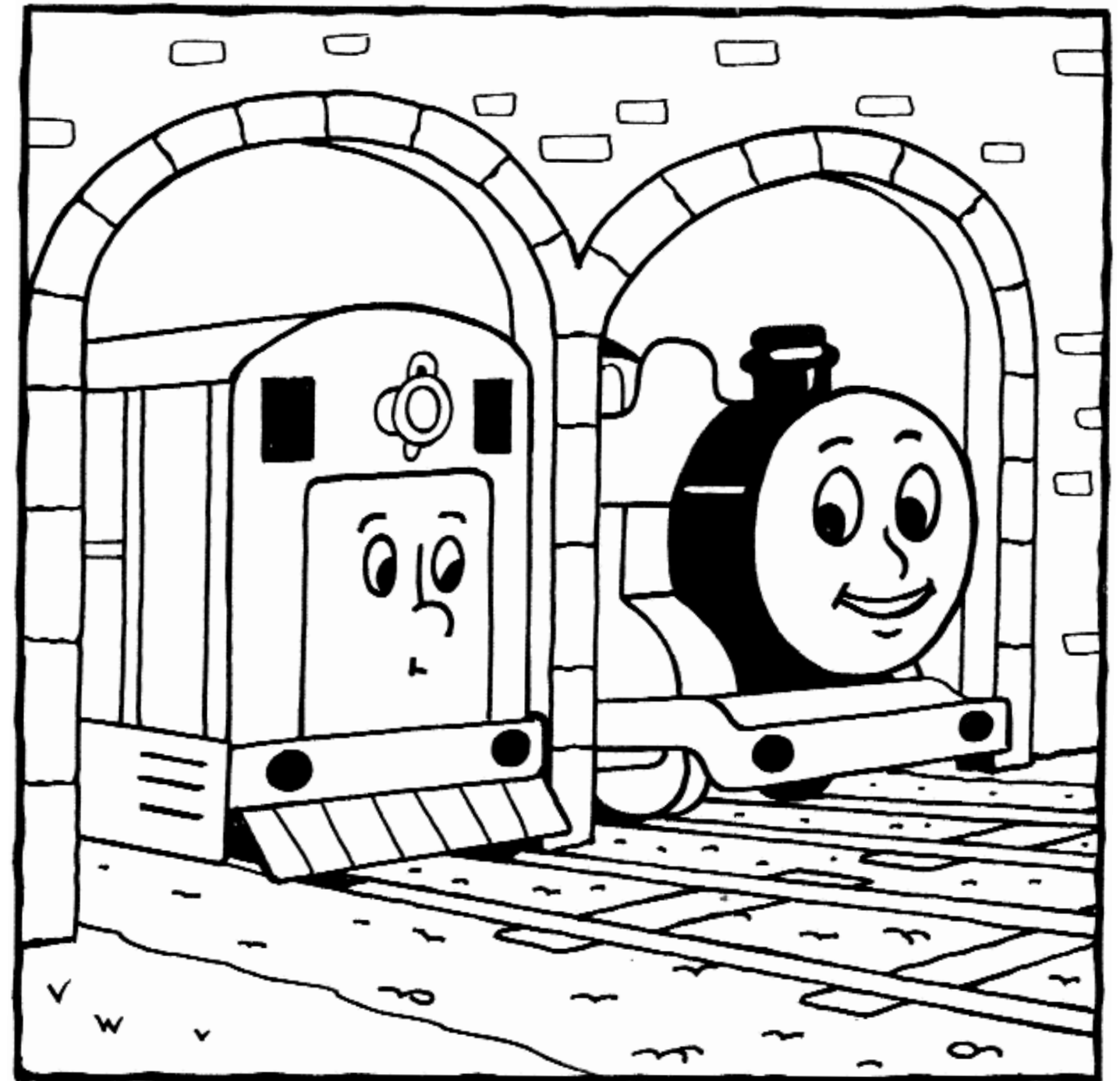
“Lucy ran towards me barking loudly and I slowed down. I just missed Andrew but hit his bike.

If it had not been for Lucy there would have been a very nasty accident.”



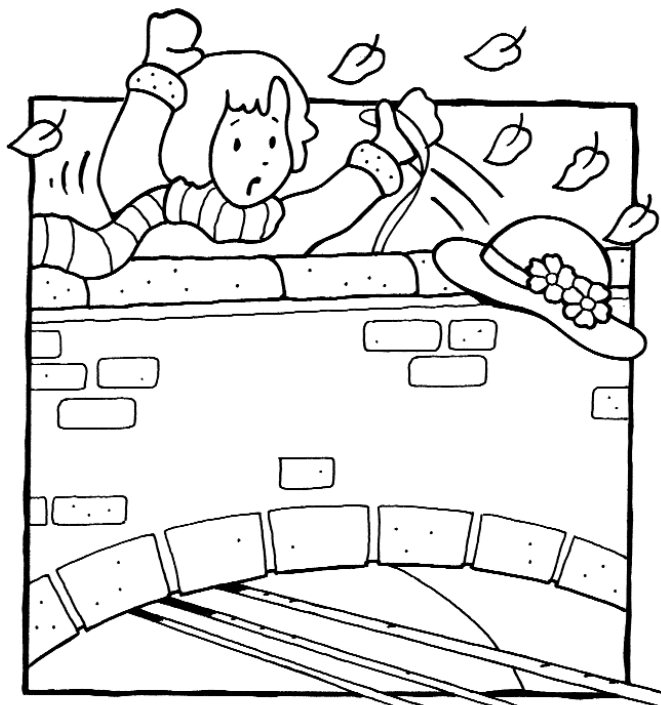
## Bad days for Thomas and his Friends

Thomas the tank engine and Toby the tram engine were talking in their shed one lunchtime.



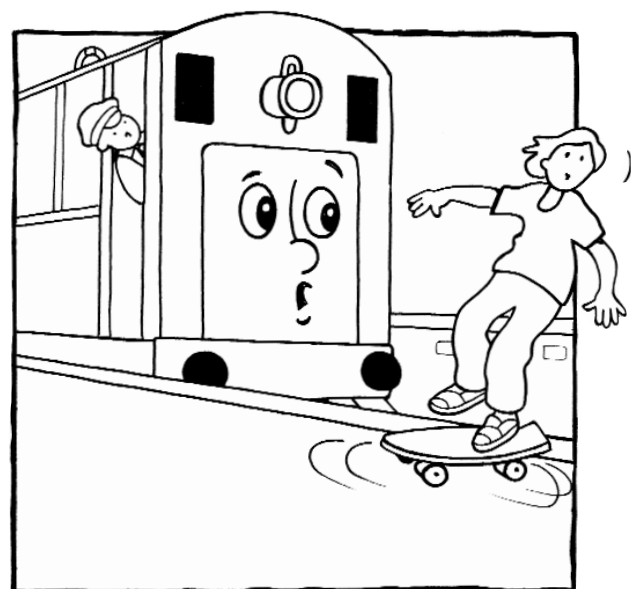
“Some children do many foolish and dangerous things on the railways, don't they Toby?” said Thomas.

“Do you remember that little girl called Alysha? asked Thomas.

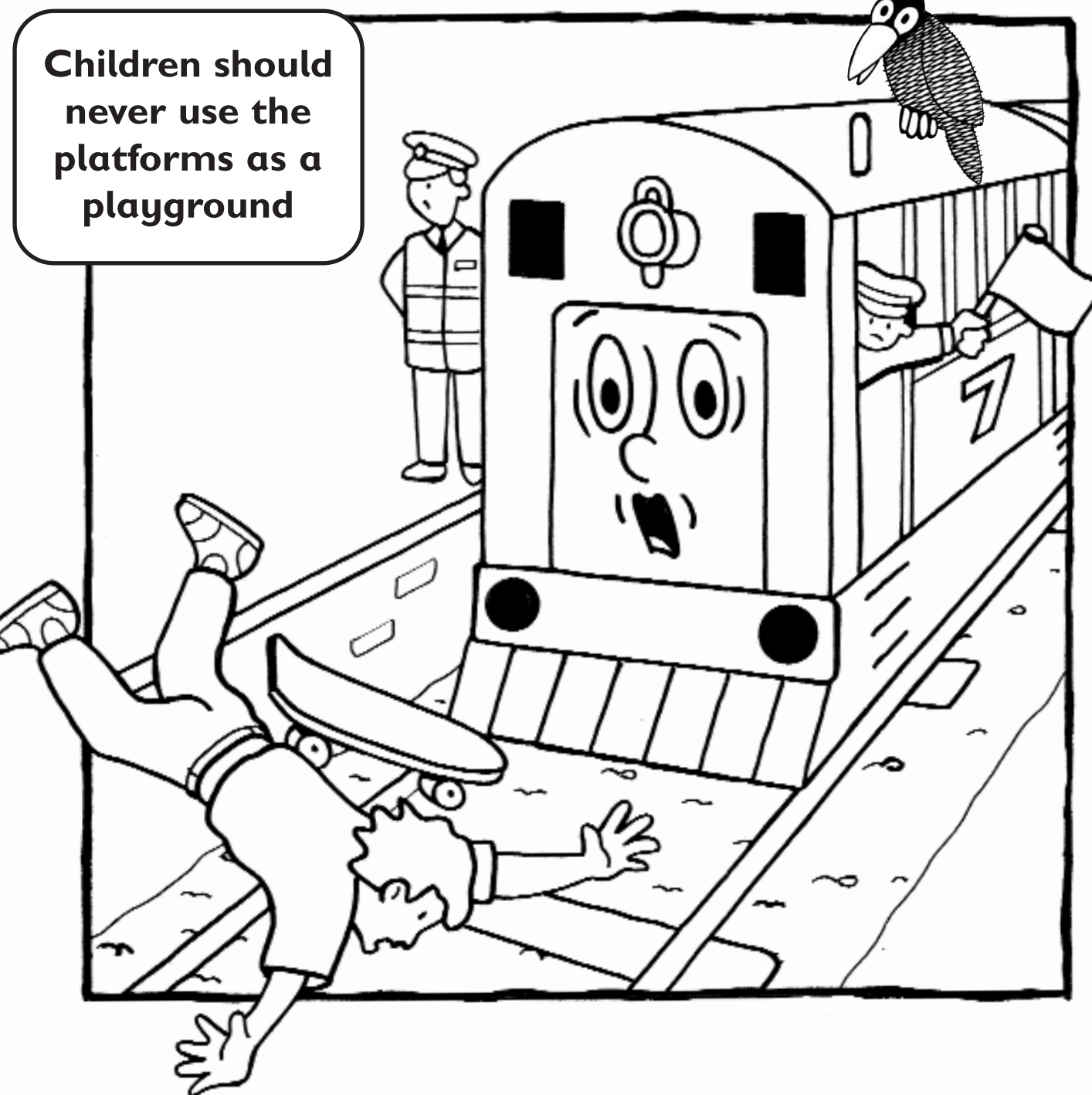
The wind blew her new hat onto the electric wires that make the new trains work.”

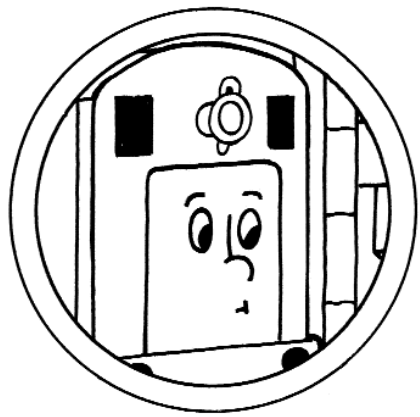


“Policeman Len also spoke to the parents of that silly boy who had been skateboarding on the platform of the station,” said Toby.

“I remember him,” said Thomas. “Didn’t he fall off the platform in front of you?”

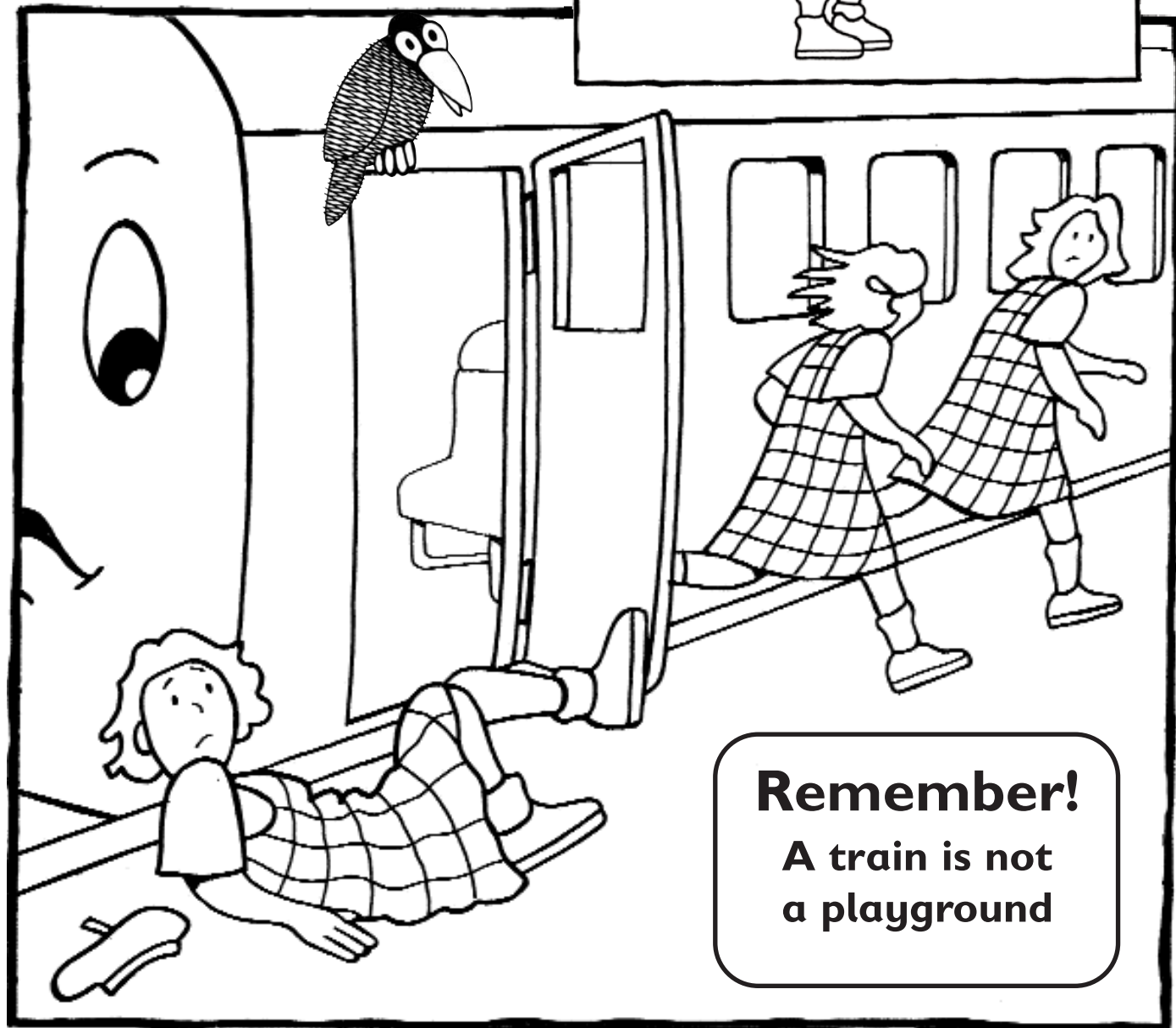
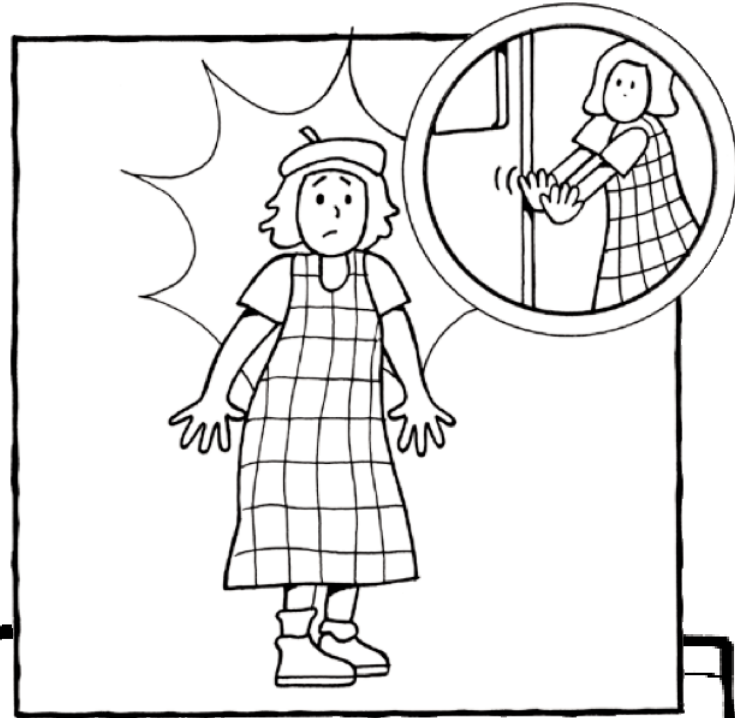
“Yes,” said Toby. “He was very lucky. I hate to think what would have happened if I’d set off!”

"Policeman Len was concerned children were behaving like that on a train, as Gemma could have been badly injured. He went to see the naughty girls' parents about it." Toby said.

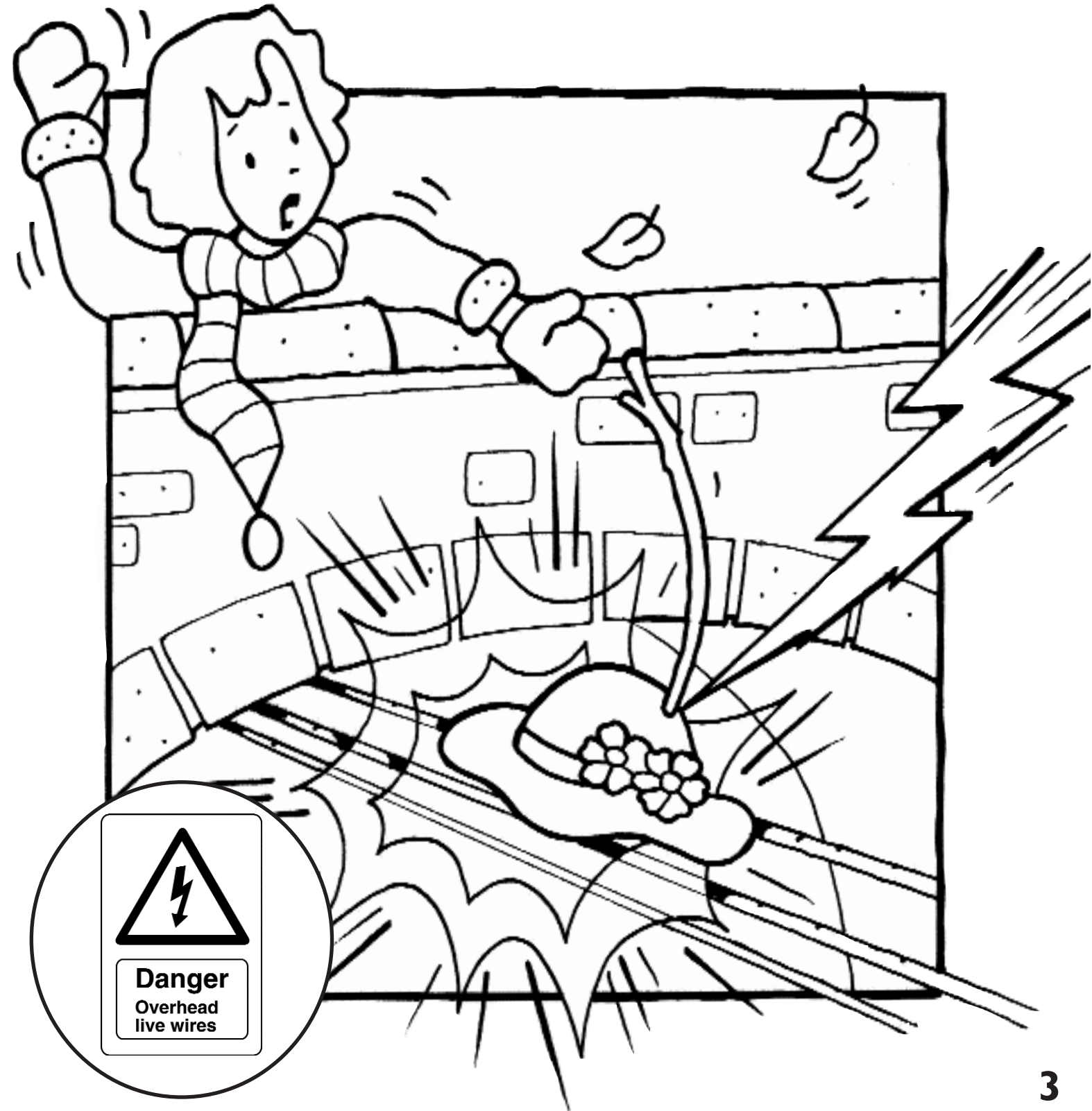



**Remember!**
